






Library Web Site Redesign: www.auctr.edu

The last redesign of the AUC Woodruff Library Website was completed in 2010 just after a major renovation of the physical building. Since that time, technologies have evolved to include video incorporation/mobile applications/more responsive navigation and site structures, and greater knowhow and expectations by users for the website experience have advanced. In addition, librarian and archivist requirements for virtual instruction have increased and the Library's methods for outreach needs to evolve to meet changing user needs.

To resolve this challenge, in February 2022 a task force was formed, led by the Digital Services Librarian, to create a new website to provide the AUC with improved accessibility, aesthetics and appearance that reflects the excellence of this Library and the member institutions it serves. The task force gathered preliminary feedback from a wide variety of AUC stakeholders via focus groups and listening sessions, including the Library Advisory Council, Library Staff, and students. The eight hours of recorded responses were then coded into 316 users' stories to help illustrate how the Library's website was being used, both internally and externally.

Partnering with the website vendor Applied Imagination, the site launched in January 2023. The Library's new website includes key end-user features like responsive design (easily viewed on both desktop and mobile devices), site architecture based on data analytics and user feedback, and a refreshed, contemporary visual design. To ensure accurate usability, the Library's new website was thoroughly tested with Library users as part of the Library's 2023 International Game Day event.


Enhanced Active Learning Space: Virginia Lacy Jones Exhibition Hall

The Virginia Lacy Jones Exhibition Hall is a sizable space in the AUC Woodruff Library which is used to host an average of 70 events per year. The space is available for use by faculty, staff and students of our four AUC member institutions. This is the first major improvement to the space since construction in 1981.

With the design plan and funding completed, the Library will begin renovating the Hall in Fall 2023. The new active learning space will facilitate the Library's vision for teaching and learning and will yield spaces that will:

- enable students to work collaboratively
- allow students and visitors to actively engage with content (including primary sources) and a range of learning technologies
- facilitate communication and interaction between students and faculty
- Enhance presentation of visual and audio content for programs, meetings, teaching and learning

Renovation will be completed and the Hall available for use in Fall 2024.



Symposiums, Exhibitions, Artist Talks, and More...

The Walter Rodney Symposium

The Walter Rodney Foundation and the AUC Woodruff Library cohosted the 20th Annual Walter Rodney Symposium in March 2023. More than 200 attendees, including many AUC students, heard from various international speakers on the theme of "Reparations for All Peoples of African Descent; Reparative Justice for Walter Rodney," at Morehouse College International Martin Luther King Jr. Chapel, and via live stream. Angela Davis served as keynote speaker. An exciting addition to this year's program was the U.S. premiere of the film "Walter Rodney: What They Don't Want You to Know." To support the legacy of Dr. Rodney and the work of the Walter Rodney Foundation, a reception was also held at the Library with approximately 100 attendees.

AUC Student Arts Festival and Exhibition

On March 23, 2023, student curators from Spelman College (SC) and Clark Atlanta University (CAU) premiered the AUC Student Arts Exhibition – Renaissance: An Ode to Creativity at the AUC Woodruff Library. Renaissance was the culminating activity of the Library's annual AUC Student Arts Festival. During the year, the Library partnered with the AUC Art History + Curatorial Studies Collaborative to provide students with an opportunity to apply their theory with practice to curate the AUC Student Arts Exhibition.


Twenty-eight AUC students submitted artwork in response to the Renaissance theme. For the first time ever, the AUC Student Arts Festival included a Critique and Presentation session. Judges from CAU and Morehouse College (MC) Art Departments provided feedback and recommendations for the selection of twelve artists to to participate in the Exhibition. Three students won top prizes for their artwork: First Place-Madison Green (SC); Second Place-Jordan Walls (MC) and Third Place-Kamryn Owolabi (SC).

Asa G. Hilliard, III Symposium

The Asa G. Hilliard, III Symposium 2022: "Return to the Source" was a two-day experience in September 2022, sponsored by the Library with support from Hon. Patsy Jo Hilliard and the Hilliard Family. The program was crafted by a team consisting of Dr. Hilliard's family and close professional friends, filled with insightful speakers, interesting panels and engaging sessions encouraging community dialogue.



Symposiums, Exhibitions, Artist Talks, and More...







As part of the Black History Month Celebration, the "One Day in January" Exhibit by photographer Horace Henry was installed in the AUC Woodruff Library January 2023. The Exhibition features historical pictures of the ecumenical service upon the assassination of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. It provides a dynamic display of more than 46 black and white photographs of Dr. King's initial burial site at Southview Cemetery, along with the April, 1968 service at Ebenezer Baptist Church for Dr. King. These include Mrs. Rosa Parks; the Reverend Dr. Ralph David Abernathy, Dr. King's immediate successor as president of the Atlanta-based Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC); the Reverend A.D. King, Dr. King's brother; his widow, Mrs. Coretta Scott King; and entertainer Harry Belafonte, among many others.

In April, the Library hosted the "One Day in January" artist talk, where the attendees were captivated by Mr.
Henry's account of his epochal moments capturing this important moment of global history. Mr. Henry is an Atlantabased photojournalist and CAU alum.

Conversations on Connections: Artist and Curator Talk

In celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, the AUC Woodruff Library hosted Conversations on Connections, an artist and curator talk in October 2022, featuring Afro-Cuban artist, Wilay Mendéz Páez and curator, Dr. Anastasia Valecce (Department of World Languages and Cultures, Spelman College). Their exhibition, "Conexiones/Connections: Visual Stories in the Body of the City," first was displayed in the Library in 2019. "Conexiones/Connections" explored everyday life and human connections mainly in the urban space of Havana, Cuba through metal sculptures and mixed media collages on cardboard.

The Conversations event served as the exhibition closing, and was an insightful and informative discussion attended by AUC students, faculty, and community members. The talks were recorded and are available in the Library's e-Scholarship repository, RADAR.

Cross Campus Collaborations and Beyond!



Partnered with Spelman College Innovation Lab to Host 24-Hour HBCU Game Jam

The Spelman College Innovation Lab sponsored the first HBCU Game Jam in February 2023, held at the AUC Woodruff Library. The HBCU Game Jam was an opportunity to welcome HBCU students to the gaming and tech industries through a fun and supportive event! More than 160 students from 15 HBCUs across the country participated in a 48- hour hackathon to compete for industry-sponsored prizes while building their own video games. Students slept overnight in the Library, and were able to expand their coding and video game creation skills, and secure internship and mentorship opportunities from top technology companies. A total of 29 video games were created in 24 hours! Event sponsors included Google, Zynga, Unity and Microsoft.

ITC Faculty Publication Launched with New Open Access Publishing Platform

This year the Library began offering a new open-access publishing platform, PressBooks, for AUC faculty to create and provide access to their own open educational resources (OER). This cloud-hosted software platform enables authors to design and publish in a variety of formats including PDF, EPUB, and Webbook. PressBooks will allow faculty to publish materials to use in class, collaborate on publications with students, editors and co-authors, and deliver content at a low cost. The Library's first PressBooks publication is entitled *Ifa: African Traditional Religions Textbook* by Dr. Will Coleman (ITC) and Dr. Awo Fa'lokun Fatunmbi, an Ifa scholar, and theologian. The textbook has received over 775 page views since posting.

Spelman College Archives and CUNY Faculty on the "Passing It Forward Oral History Project"



Collaborating with Spelman College Archives and the City University of New York (CUNY), the AUC Woodruff Library provided online access to oral history interviews from LGBTQ+ elders of color in our e-scholarship repository, RADAR. Through their own voices and images, the Passing It Forward project links the personal stories of LGBTQ+ elders of color above 50 years an older to the political and social movements in which they are connected. These intergenerational conversations allowed this growing and important population to reflect on their life and wisdom. The collection consists of 150 interviews conducted by collegeaged interviewers over the course of two years in 2020-2021. Each interview includes a video file with closed captioning and a transcript that can be downloaded. The oral history project was coordinated by Dr. Juan Battle, Professor of Sociology at the City University of New York who donated the collection to the Spelman College Archives.



Subject Specialists Partner with Morehouse Faculty to Advance Studies in African History, Digital Humanities, Cultural Heritage Preservation, and Social Justice

In partnership with Morehouse College, the Humanities /Virtual Reality & Games Studies Librarian and the Head of the Online Learning and Technology Unit, participated in a one-day exploratory retreat entitled the "Gullah Road Scholars Expedition in South Carolina." The retreat was part of Morehouse College's Mellon Humanities for All Times: Movement Memory and Justice Project, a 3-year initiative devoted to the study of the intersections of African History, Digital Humanities, Cultural Heritage Preservation, and Social Justice." Drs. Corrie Claiborne and Monique Earl-Lewis of Morehouse College are the principal investigators for this grant. The purpose of the expedition was to take faculty, students, and staff of the AUC Community to various African American cultural sites of memory and to think about ways to incorporate these sites of memory into the educational work currently being done. Following the retreat, the subject specialists demonstrated the usage of storytelling technology for teaching and learning at the Morehouse Mellon Public History and Digital Humanities Project Fall 2022 Faculty Institute.

Partnered with the AUC Data Science Initiative's K-12 Working Group to Host Listening Session

The Library's Assistant Director for Research, Learning and Technology Services, the STEM Librarian, AUC Data Science Faculty Advisory Board, and the Graduate Success Facilitator Librarian represented the Library on the working group for the AUC Data Science Initiative (DSI) for K-12. Sessions were conducted to hear invited educators' concerns about data science curricula in K-12, and to explore collaboration opportunities between local K-12 schools and AUC institutions. The sessions were chaired by DSI's Deputy Director, Dr. H. Justin Ballenger with the working group members from Clark Atlanta University, Morehouse College, Spelman College, and Morehouse School of Medicine.

Inter and Intra Technology Collaboration

In March 2023 the AUC Woodruff Library was awarded a significant grant from the Mellon Foundation to support the needed enhancement of its digital infrastructure that would expand the Library's preservation of, and access to, African American Studies archival content and scholarly resources.

This project, in collaboration with the Archives Research Center and the Digital Services Department, will establish a computing and storage infrastructure that can scale to meet the demands of digitization and collection activities and partnerships such as those with the HBCU Library Alliance and the Harvard University Library. Further it will enable the Library to centralize the disparate systems that currently support digitization and collection activities. Add to this infrastructure the creation of a high-speed fiber ring that the AUC Council of CIO's in collaboration with Georgia Tech, and the Library is poised to respond to the needed footprint for maximizing its digital environment.

The Spelman College Social Justice Program and the Library hosted a reception honoring the Atlanta Student Movement alumni, historians and documentarians who were recognized with the prestigious 2022 Joseph R. Biden Lifetime Achievement Award.

SEPT | Equitable Dinners – 1906 Atlanta Race Massacre

The Equitable Dinners was host venue by the Library to discuss the 1906 Atlanta Race Massacre and race in society. The Equitable Dinners series is a collaboration between Out of Hand Theatre, National Center for Civil and Human Rights, The King Center, and Partnership for Southern Equity, and the Absalom Jones Center for Racial Healing.



OCT | International Open Access Week

"Community over Commercialization" was the theme of the October Open Access week. The Library promoted agreements negotiated with American Chemical Society and Cambridge University Press which provided publishing opportunities to AUC faculty at no cost, as well as 300 Cambridge journals via Open Access.

WABE reporters and the Library co-hosted a 2022 Georgia Votes LIVE session, one of a series that was held on college campuses throughout the state of Georgia, to discuss some of the core issues driving the 2022 election. The session was pod podcast.

Over 90 students joined the Library for our annual International Games Day inspired by ALA's International Games Month and co-sponsored by Microsoft. Participating students enjoyed a variety of games, including virtual reality, Xbox video games, floor and board games.

Established in 1982, the Atlanta University Center (AUC) Robert W. Woodruff Library is named in honor of the late Robert Winship Woodruff, philanthropist and former CEO of The Coca-Cola Company. The Library serves the nation's largest consortium of historically black colleges and universities, which includes* Clark Atlanta University, the Interdenominational Theological Center, Morehouse College and Spelman College. In addition to the aesthetic benefits of this state-of-the-art facility, the Library has evolved into a model repository of information resources and a front-runner in the innovative delivery of digital resources.

The AUC Woodruff Library is the winner of the 2016 Excellence in Academic Libraries Award in the university category from the Association of Collegiate and Research Libraries (ACRL). Library CEO Loretta Parham was named the ACRL 2017 Academic/Research Librarian of the Year. In July 2022, the AUC Woodruff Library became the 127th member of the Association of Research Libraries, becoming the second HBCU in its history to achieve this distinction. The Library is a nonprofit corporation under the Georgia Nonprofit Corporation Code and operates exclusively for educational and charitable purposes as defined by Section 501(c)3 of the IRS Code. It is governed by a nine-member Board of Trustees. The AUC Woodruff Library is also home to the Archives Research Center, which is noted for its holdings of materials on the African American experience, including the John Henrik Clarke Africana and African American Collection, the Henry P. Slaughter and Countee Cullen Memorial Collection, and the Southern Education Foundation Collection. In addition, at the request of Morehouse College, the Library serves as custodian of the Morehouse College Martin Luther King, Jr. Collection, as well as custodian of the Joseph Echols Lowery and Evelyn Gibson Lowery Collection.
