

Biography of Dr. Ivis Renne King

Dr. Ivis Renne King is an Associate Professor of Social Work at Clark Atlanta University and the Deputy Director of the Atlanta University Center (AUC) Data Science Initiative (DSI). In this role, she co-leads strategic efforts to integrate data science across disciplines, with a particular focus on equity-centered approaches in social work education.

Dr. King is a member of the AUC Data Science Education Working Group and serves on the DSI Faculty Advisory Board. She has been instrumental in embedding data science into undergraduate and graduate social work courses, including the development of *Issues in Child Welfare with Data Science* and *Data Science in Child Welfare*. She is also a co-designer of the interdisciplinary course *Data and the African Diaspora*, which connects data science concepts with culturally grounded analysis and applications.

As an instructor in the AUC Pre-Freshman Experience (PFx) summer program, Dr. King mentors student teams conducting research projects such as *Using Data to Advocate for Health Justice: Exploring Health-Related Data for Children in Foster Care* and *Keeping Communities Safe Through Data: Post-Intervention Child Welfare*. She has also served as a faculty mentor for the CAU Provost's Summer Data Science Education Research Program and the National African American Child and Family Research Center's Undergraduate Emerging Scholars Program.

A certified Carpentries Instructor, Dr. King teaches core competencies in Data Carpentry and Software Carpentry, contributing to the broader goal of diversifying the data science workforce. She is the Principal Investigator for the National Science Foundation (NSF) IUSE grant titled *Integrating Data Science into Undergraduate Social Work Education*.

Dr. King earned her Ph.D. from Clark Atlanta University, her M.S.W. from Georgia State University, and her B.A. in Psychology from Fort Valley State University.
